## Senior Students

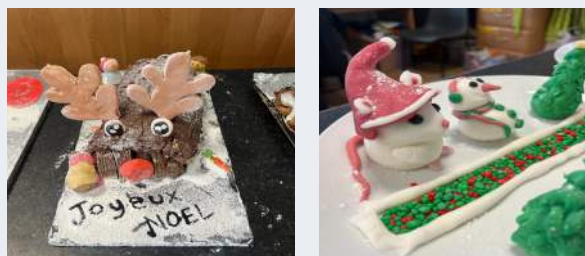
